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
#### **Lesson Three: The Covenant Part I**





<b>Life Application:</b> Ask God to open your eyes and heart to opportunities to serve others and develop relationships through your normal routines of life, so that you might impact them for the kingdom. Keep a journal of these experiences and reflect on how God is growing and developing you in the strategic use of your life, for His glory and the advancement of His kingdom.32
