# Kingdom People

### A WORLD-MISSIONS STRATEGY CENTER

Gary Hillyard was the pastor of Beverly Park Church in Seattle, Washington. Church attendance ran about 110 on Sundays. Forty church members took training to learn to pray, and 8 committed themselves to pray daily for God to show them how He wanted to grow their church. Nineteen members began a study of *Experiencing God*.

When immigrants from the Ukraine began attending Beverly Park, members joined God in what He was doing. One day a new family arrived, and the man asked Gary if the church would like to have his father's house in Lugansk, a city of 650,000. Gary called me to ask to whom they should give the house. I responded that this sounded like God's invitation for the church to get involved in world missions.

Though behind in its budget, Beverly Park voted to accept the house, and members began praying. Within weeks Don English called Gary. "Do you remember our prayer time seven years ago [before the fall of Communism] when I sensed God would one day call me as a missionary to the Soviet Union? Well, God has told me that now is the time to go."

Gary replied, "I have good news for you. We have your house, and it's in Lugansk, Ukraine." Beverly Park voted to call Don and his family to be its missionaries. But Gary called me again and said the church had only \$21 in the bank. "Now what do we do?" he asked.

I suggested they clarify that this was indeed the Lord's leading. Then they needed to trust the Lord to provide for what He had called them to do. And I said, "Don't hesitate to allow God's people to give." They spent their Sunday-evening service in prayer for God's provision. Following the prayer time, they had \$2,400 on the front pew, including two pledges for \$1,000 and \$500. By the end of the week, they had \$4,000 to send Don and his family to Lugansk.

Once there, Don received invitations to lead Bible studies in homes, at the elementary and high schools, for university faculty, and even for five hundred people at the medical center. When the government heard about Don, they asked to have a ceremony to thank America for their city library, which had been partially funded by the Marshal Plan following World War II. Don agreed. The national television station that broadcast the ceremony asked Don to say a few words. Less than two months into his work, Don was on national television telling the Ukraine about Jesus. Later he was invited to speak to the parliament.

Don also worked with the local churches to hold evangelistic meetings, and between four hundred and five hundred people were saved in a week. They wanted to distribute Bibles in the Lugansk region, so Don called his home church to request prayer. One hour after Beverly Park's prayer meeting, a church in Texas called and said it wanted to buy Bibles for the Ukraine. The government asked for food and medical supplies for the elderly, handicapped, and children in the city. Again Don called his home church. The next day Bob Dixon called from Texas Baptist Men. They had been asked by the State Department to oversee the distribution of food in the former Soviet republics. He had three 40-foot shipping containers of food that could be sent immediately.

Workers also started a Bible college, provided medical equipment, planted churches, and worked with orphans. In one conversation Gary wept as he explained how their church at one time had struggled to pay the electric bill. But now significant financial and personnel resources were being funneled through the little church to touch the world.

# On Mission to the World

When you respond to God's invitation to an intimate love relationship with Him, He brings you into a special partnership with Himself. God has added you to a local body of believers. Together you are the body of Christ in your community. As the Head of your church, Christ Himself is guiding and working through your congregation to accomplish the will of the Father.

The Spirit who bonds you to other believers in a local church also connects you to all believers around the world. God's people from every local body of Christ are part of God's kingdom. Christians are kingdom people, and Christ Himself is the eternal King over His kingdom. He "has made us to be a kingdom and priests to serve his God and Father" (Rev. 1:6). In this relationship with Christ as King, you become involved in His mission to reconcile a lost world to God. To be related to Christ is to be on mission with Him. You cannot be in relationship with Jesus and not be on mission. Jesus said, "As the Father has sent me, I am sending you" (John 20:21).

#### God Has the World on His Heart!

"God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life" (John 3:16). God fashioned Christ's first body by the Holy Spirit and placed Him in Mary. Christ became flesh and dwelled among us (see John 1:14). Jesus provided for our salvation through His death and resurrection. When Jesus returned to heaven, God fashioned a new body of Christ through the Holy Spirit. This body is the believers God has added to the church.

Jesus now functions as the Head of His body, the local church, to guide it in carrying out the will of the Father. God established each church as a body of Christ so He could continue His redemptive work in the world. When Christ functions as the Head of His church, God will use that body to carry out His will in every part of the earth.

A church is a living organism, a body with Christ as its Head. Each part of that body is related to Christ and to one another. Anytime God guides His people, He can impact a world through that congregation. Jesus gave us a commission to "go and make disciples of all nations" (Matt. 28:19). As they obey that command, every congregation is a world-missions strategy center. God can impact the world through one church if it adjusts itself to God's activity.

#### Impacting the World

Answers: a. An angel of the Lord—the Spirit—guided Philip. b. He knew only that he was to travel south on the road from Jerusalem to Gaza. c. He saw a God-fearing man who had been to Jerusalem to worship. Because the Ethiopian was reading from Isaiah, Philip saw a man who was seeking God, a man interested in spiritual matters. Philip knew that only God could draw a person to Himself like that. d. The Spirit told Philip to approach the chariot. From that place Philip could then find out what he needed to do to join God in His activity. e. Philip asked a probing question. f. God used Philip to tell the good news about Jesus Christ. The Ethiopian believed the gospel message, was saved, and was baptized. g. God evidently had a plan for getting the gospel message to Ethiopia. He chose a key leader in the government and used Philip to lead him to Christ. God used Philip's obedience on a single day to carry the gospel to a strategic kingdom in Africa.

One Sunday while preaching in a church in Florida, I spoke about the woman at the well in John 4:1-41. I stated that when the woman faithfully shared with her countrymen what Christ had done in her life, she saw her entire region come to faith in Christ. Then I asked, "Who will be the woman at the well for those places who still do not know Jesus?"The altar call elicited a tremendous response as many people wept in prayer. One man approached me and said, "God told me I am to be the woman at the well for my people in Pakistan. A woman approached and said, "God told me I am to be the woman at the well for my country, Ghana." People from all over the world lined up to tell me God had convicted them that they were to return to their native countries to share with their people what Christ had done in their lives.

#### Acts 8:26-39

<sup>26</sup> "Now an angel of the Lord said to Philip, 'Go south to the road—the desert road—that goes down from Jerusalem to Gaza.' 27 So he started out, and on his way he met an Ethiopian eunuch, an important official in charge of all the treasury of Candace, queen of the Ethiopians. This man had gone to Jerusalem to worship, 28 and on his way home was sitting in his chariot reading the book of Isaiah the prophet. 29 The Spirit told Philip, 'Go to that chariot and stay near it.'

30 "Then Philip ran up to the chariot and heard the man reading Isaiah the prophet. 'Do you understand what you are reading?' Philip asked.

31 " 'How can I.' he said. 'unless someone explains it to me?' So he invited Philip to come up and sit with him.

32 "The eunuch was reading this passage of Scripture: 'He was led like a sheep to the slaughter, and as a lamb before the shearer is silent, so he did not open his mouth. 33 In his humiliation he was deprived of iustice. Who can speak of his descendants? For his life was taken from the earth."

34 "The eunuch asked Philip, 'Tell me, please, who is the prophet talking about, himself or someone else?' 35 Then Philip began with that very passage of Scripture and told him the good news about Jesus.

36 "As they traveled along the road, they came to some water and the eunuch said, 'Look, here is water. Why shouldn't I be baptized?' 38 And he gave orders to stop the chariot. Then both Philip and the eunuch went down into the water and Philip baptized him. 39 When they came up out of the water, the Spirit of the Lord suddenly took Philip away, and the eunuch did not see him again, but went on his way reioicing."



The pastor of the church was weeping. God had brought the world into his church, but his church had not necessarily had the world on its heart. Too often a church receives new members who are natives of other countries and merely adds them to its membership roll without asking God why He brought people from around the world to join their church body. God intends for every local church to be a world-missions strategy center. God will equip each church to carry out the Great Commission if it will be a careful steward of every person God sends to it.

Pray and ask God if He wants you to become involved in some way with one of these groups.

When you adjust your life to God and become a Kingdom-oriented person, He will involve you in His work anywhere in the world He chooses. He is at work all over the world building His kingdom.

I was speaking at a conference in Minneapolis-Saint Paul about participating with God to touch a world. A pastor from an inner-city church said, "That's how God told me to function as a pastor! We began to look for what God was doing. Someone from Jamaica joined our church and asked, 'Would you come and preach in our country. We need the Lord so much.' I took some people with me, and we started three churches. The next month God added to our church someone from another Caribbean nation. We went there and started churches. Now we sponsor mission churches in three Caribbean nations." Then he smiled and said, "Last Sunday we had a man join our church from Ghana in west Africa. I don't know what God is up to, but we're ready to see!"

This congregation discovered they were Kingdom citizens. To experience God and to know and do God's will is to put your life alongside His activity and to let His Spirit show you why that happened in your church. Adjust your life to Him and let Him work through you to draw a world to Himself.

Isn't it tragic when we become so self-centered we enter God's presence and say, "O God, bless me. Bless my family. Bless my church"?

Then God says, "I've been trying to do that all along but in a completely different way than you anticipated. I want you to deny self. Pick up your cross and follow Me. I will lead you to places where I am working, and I'll include you in My activity. You will be an instrument in My hand so I use your life to touch a world. When I do that through you, you will truly experience My blessings."

## Koinonia

In the mind and teaching of Jesus, a church was a vital, living, dynamic fellowship of believers. The Greek word *koinonia*, most frequently translated *fellowship*, is the best way to describe what a church ought to be. In this unit I will use the word *koinonia* to mean the fullest possible partnership and fellowship with God and with other believers.

Koinonia, or intimate fellowship, in the church is based on personal koinonia with God and individual believers. Answers: a. John said he had seen, heard, and touched Jesus. John had an experiential knowledge of Jesus. He had come to know Him as the "eternal life" (v. 2). John also recorded Jesus' words "This is eternal life: that they may know you, the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom you have sent" (John 17:3). Eternal life means knowing God by experience in a real, personal way. This is koinonia—fellowship with God. b. John proclaimed Jesus so others would believe in Him and have fellowship with John and other believers. c. When we fellowship with God and when others come into fellowship with Him and with us, our joy is made complete, and we experience the cleansing work of Jesus' blood. d. Such a person is a liar. His or her life is a lie. e. If a person walks in the light as God is in the light, he or she has fellowship with other believers and experiences forgiveness and the cleansing of sin.

#### Fellowship Among Believers

Our *koinonia* as believers is with God and His Son, Jesus Christ. This fellowship is an intimate partnership. It is the sharing of all God is with us and all we are with God. To me, *koinonia* is the most complete expression of a love relationship with God. When you live in this kind of love relationship with God, you will have the same quality of loving fellowship with other believers.

First John clearly states that your relationships with your Christian brothers and sisters are an expression of your relationship with God. You cannot be in true fellowship with God and out of fellowship with other believers.

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#### A Laotian Refugee

In Vancouver I served as the interim pastor of a small church. A Laotian refugee family had joined the church the week before I came. I knew God never adds to the body by accident. My responsibility as the pastor was to learn what God was doing when He added this family to our church.

Thomas, the father, had been saved in a refugee camp in Thailand. His life was so gloriously transformed he wanted all the Laotian people to know Jesus. He went all over our community trying to find his Laotian brothers and lead them to Christ. The first week Thomas led 15 adults to the Lord. The next week he led 11 to the Lord, and he wept because he felt he was unfaithful to the Lord.

In our next church business meeting I said, "We need to start a Laotian mission church." I shared all I knew of what God was doing. "I believe God is leading those people to the Lord so we can start a Laotian mission," I explained. Then I asked the church to decide how they sensed God wanted us to respond. They voted to start a Laotian mission church.

Then I said, "We ought to call Thomas as the pastor." I told them what God was doing in Thomas's life. God had given him a pastor's heart. He had a burden for evangelism. He had just enrolled in a local Baptist theological college to train for anything God wanted to do through him. The church voted to call Thomas as the pastor of the new mission.

Two months later, Thomas was invited to a meeting for ethnic pastors in Saint Louis. Thomas asked, "Can I take some friends with me?" I didn't know what that meant until he said he wanted to take 18 friends with him. Then he said, "Henry, would you mind if I came back through all the major cities of Canada? My relatives are in all of these cities. God wants me to go and lead some of them to the Lord. If God will help me, I'll find a pastor for them. Then they can have a church in every major city of Canada."

Then I knew God was doing something special. I said, "Oh, Thomas, please go!" He did. Later that year at Christmas, Laotian people from all across Canada came to celebrate the new life in Christ they had found.

Later the Laotian government granted permission to start churches. Thomas returned to Laos and preached the gospel, and 133 relatives and friends came to know the Lord. He started four mission churches. He linked the church in Vancouver with the Laotian churches with the desire to see all Laotian people come to know the Lord.

When Thomas joined our church, all we saw was one Laotian refugee. What did God see? He saw a people and a whole nation being drawn to Himself. When God honors your church by placing a new member in the body, ask God to show you what He is up to. He wants to touch your community and maybe even the world through your church.

# Koinonia in the Kingdom

Kingdom people are interrelated with other members and believers in the Kingdom worldwide. After serving 22 years as a pastor, I became the director of missions for an association of 11 churches and mission churches in the greater Vancouver area of British Columbia, Canada. Guiding a church to walk with Christ as the Head of His body is one matter. Guiding an association of 11 congregations to walk together with God with one heart and one mind is quite different. I had to face some serious questions:

- Would God speak to the churches individually and then bring them to one mind as they functioned together as an association?
- Would the churches respond to God when He spoke?
- Would the churches have the same kind of *koinonia* (fellowship) with one another as believers have with other Christians in a local church?
- Would churches be willing to give freely of themselves in order to experience the fullest life God has to offer (see Luke 9:23–24)?
- Would godly fellowship be expressed by the free sharing of resources with churches that had needs?

I came to this new assignment with the conviction that "the God we serve is able ... and he will" (**Dan. 3:17**). Biblical principles of God's working with His people do not change. Helping a group of churches learn to walk with God in intimate *koinonia* with Him and with one another took time, but God is the One who does that kind of miraculous work. I was only a vessel through whom He chose to work.

Though we were a small band of congregations, God manifested His presence in the lives of the churches and the association. God led our churches to walk by faith as we witnessed to the people attending the World's Fair. God worked through our association to begin ministry to East Indians. In four years the number of churches and missions in our association doubled. Student work grew from one part-time student director to five full-time directors. Almost one hundred people expressed a sense of call into ministry or mission work. Once strained relationships with other church groups were healed and flourished into dynamic, cooperative efforts of fellowship and outreach. God did so much more than we could ever ask or think, according to the Holy Spirit's enabling power at work in His churches (see Eph. 3:20-21).

As you read the following paragraphs about the relationships among churches in our association, underline some things that indicate we had functioning koinonia among the churches.

While I served as a pastor in Saskatchewan, the Holy Spirit developed unique *koino-nia* among the sister churches. Together our churches developed a network to reach the entire province for Christ. Much like the New Testament churches, we considered everything each of us possessed as belonging by love to one another (see Acts 4:34–35). A church's resources don't belong to the people themselves. The church is merely a steward of them. Everything a church has belongs to the Kingdom. Anything our church had was available to all the others. When one church called a student minister, he became a

resource for every other church for helping to develop their student ministry. When our church had a summer youth program, we invited small churches to participate with us. We also shared copy machines and other material resources. If one church needed financial help, we didn't hesitate to let God's people know. Then we took an offering. Once we even mortgaged our building to help a mission church purchase its own.

This kind of sharing developed a deep sense of *koinonia* among our churches. We belonged to one another. We needed one another. We went out of our way to help one another and meet each church's needs. We learned to love one another. We planned times to get together for fellowship and mutual encouragement. That is what Christ's kingdom ought to be like. The watching world should be able to say, "Look how they love one another." That unique quality of love can come only from God. When people see Godlike love, they will be drawn to Christ and to His church.

# What kinds of things indicate the churches had functioning koinonia? List them in the margin.

When *koinonia* exists among churches, it is evident in their relationships. We cooperated in our commission to reach our world for Christ. We were able to do things together that no one church alone could have done effectively. We shared anything we had if it would meet the need of a sister church. We spent time together and loved one another.

Can that kind of *koinonia* exist among churches not only on an associational level but also on a state, provincial, national, or international level? Yes! Can Godlike *koinonia* exist among churches of different denominations as they cooperate to achieve greater Kingdom purposes? Yes! However, humans left to their own ways cannot achieve those kinds of relationships. Only God through His Holy Spirit can create and sustain *koinonia* among His people. He wants to be the King, Ruler, and Sovereign over all His kingdom. When He is allowed to rule, barriers erected by humans inevitably fall.

When we have koinonia with God, the same quality and nature of that koinonia will be reflected when we relate to—

- brothers and sisters in our local church;
- other churches in a local area;
- other churches in a state or province;
- other churches in a nation;
- other churches in the world:
- other Christian denominations.
- Based on the relationships your church has with other churches and denominations in your local area and worldwide, what kind of koinonia would a watching world see?
- What does your church do or fail to do that indicates a lack of koinonia with other churches or Christian groups? For instance, some church-league sports teams develop a poor reputation in the community because of their displays of anger, jealousy, rudeness, violence, and hatred. That reflects a deep fellowship problem.

If your church has a *koinonia* problem with other Christian churches or groups, that indicates a deeper *koinonia* problem with the Lord. I am not suggesting that doctrinal differences ought to be compromised, but we can act like brothers and sisters who love one another. *Koinonia* takes on new dimensions, new possibilities, and new richness as churches relate in the wider circles of the Kingdom. This is the same way love works.

#### Loving on a New Level

Suppose, on a scale of 1 to 10, you are loving at level 2—you love your parents and family who love you, and you love your friends who care about you. Suppose God enables you to love your archenemy, as Jesus commanded in Matthew 5:43-48. If you can love your enemy at level 10, your capacity to love other persons will increase. All others you have been loving will receive a greater dimension of concern than you have previously been able to give them.

You and I usually do not try to improve our capacity to love by loving those who are difficult to love. Often when we try to love our enemy, frustration and anger result instead of a new kind of love. Then we respond, "Lord, I didn't want You to bring anger into my life. I wanted You to bring love into my life." But God can deepen our capacity to love as He enables us to care for the unlovely. When we learn to love on a deeper level, our capacity to love others grows.

While I was leading an association of churches, we made a commitment to love everyone and to help every person in our city know the Lord. Isn't that what Jesus commanded us in the Great Commission (see Matt. 28:18–20)? God placed me in a relationship with a person who had a deep **love for anarchists**—young adults who were angry at everybody and wanted to destroy established order and authority. This man said, "Henry, go with me to the anarchists' restaurant. I want you to listen to this group of people express their anger and bitterness. I want you to see how God can bring the gospel to them."

That was a life-changing experience for me. I sat in that restaurant for three hours listening to an outpouring of hatred and bitterness. By the aid of the Spirit of God, with my heart, mind, and life I came to love those people. Consequently, I was able to pour out greater love on the next Christian I met. By teaching me to love anarchists, God brought me to a deeper capacity to love.

## Cooperative Relationships Among Churches

The churches of the New Testament were interdependent. Each was independent before the Lord; yet they needed one another. They helped and encouraged one another. They had cooperative relationships that enhanced their experience of God.



As you read about each of the following relationships, underline or write in the margin examples that clearly indicate the New Testament churches had *koinonia* with one another. I've given you one example.

The young church in Jerusalem. On the day of Pentecost three thousand people came to trust in Christ. We do not know how many of these remained in Jerusalem after the Jewish feast was over. We know, however, the Jerusalem church had many members. Early on, they met in the temple courts and in many smaller groups in individual homes. They met daily for teaching, fellowship, meals, and prayer. They shared their material resources with any believer who had a need (see Acts 2:42-47). These many small congregations were interdependent. Because of koinonia they were "one in heart and mind" (Acts 4:32).

Jerusalem shares with Antioch. When the gospel began to bear fruit among the Greeks in Antioch, the Jerusalem church sent Barnabas to investigate and help the young church. When Barnabas saw God's activity there, he enlisted Saul (Paul) to come and help. Together they remained in Antioch teaching the new converts (see Acts 11:19–26).

Antioch provides for needs in Jerusalem. Word came to the church in Antioch that their Christian brothers and sisters in Judea were suffering from a famine. Because of koinonia "the disciples, each according to his ability, decided to provide help for the brothers living in Judea. This they did, sending their gift to the elders by Barnabas and Saul" (Acts 11:29-30). These churches were not totally independent. They were bound together by their common koinonia with Christ. They cared for one another's needs from their love for one another.

Antioch sends out Barnabas and Saul. The church at Antioch was missions-minded, sharing Christ's heart for a lost world. One day "while they were worshiping the Lord and fasting, the Holy Spirit said, 'Set apart for me Barnabas and Saul for the work to which I have called them.' So after they had fasted and prayed, they placed their hands on them and sent them off" (Acts 13:2-3). The church at Antioch had freely received leaders, and they freely gave them for the advancement of the Kingdom.

Notice Barnabas and Saul (Paul) had already been called to take the gospel to the Gentiles. Saul's conversion and call had occurred several years before (see Acts 9:1-19; Gal. 1:16-24). Only in the midst of the body of Christ did they come to know the right timing for their missionary work. God spoke to them by the Holy Spirit and through the church. Don't be afraid to trust God and your church to help you know God's will and His timing for your Kingdom assignments.

Jerusalem helps maintain sound doctrine. When a dispute arose about the nature of salvation, Paul and Barnabas went to Jerusalem for consultation. The apostles, elders, and church in Jerusalem helped settle the dispute. Then they sent two of their own members to the church in Antioch to instruct, encourage, and strengthen the Gentile Christians.

Other churches cooperate for Kingdom purposes. Throughout Paul's letters we read about ways the churches cooperated with other Christians for the Kingdom's sake.

• The faith of the Roman Christians encouraged others all over the Christian world (see Rom. 1:8-12). Paul planned to receive assistance from this church for a journey to Spain that he was planning (see Rom. 15:24).

- Churches in Macedonia and Achaia sent contributions to the poor Christians in Jerusalem (see Rom. 15:26-27).
- The church in Philippi frequently provided financial support for Paul so he could preach the gospel and start churches in other cities (see Phil. 4:14-16).
- The churches at Colosse and Laodicea shared workers (Epaphras) and letters from Paul (see Col. 4:12-16).
- The believers in the church at Thessalonica inspired and became models to all of the believers in Macedonia and Achaia (see 1 Thess. 1:6-10).

A small group of Christians felt burdened for the inner city of a major city and did not know of any other evangelical church that was reaching that massive district. God led some of them to quit their jobs, raise their own financial support, and by faith start a new church in that area. After they had begun, it was announced that a megachurch was going to sponsor a new church in the same area and intended to invest massive financial and human resources in order to build the church quickly. When the small church heard the news, rather than fearing the "competition," they rejoiced. News that God had motivated a second church to reach the same area confirmed God truly wanted to reach that vast population for Christ. The little church raised funds to fully equip the second church's nursery. They even asked to place the second church in its budget, even though it was not in their denomination and had far more resources at its disposal than the original church did. The small church's burden to reach the people of that community led them to invest in the ministry of the second church. Every time someone came to Christ in the second church, the people of the first church could celebrate that another person had been added to the kingdom of God.

## **Experiencing More of God**

A believer cannot experience God in all the dimensions God intends for him or her apart from the body of Christ—a local church. As the body goes on mission together to the ends of the earth, Christians begin to experience the fuller dimensions of life in God's kingdom. As you experience *koinonia* with other groups of God's people, you experience greater dimensions of God's presence at work in your world. God has created channels through which you and your church can touch the world for Him. Allow Him to break down any barriers that may prevent you from experiencing God through *koinonia* with others. Go to Him and watch for His initiative. He can show you how, with whom, and when He wants to use you.

Notice that the last three realities identify your response to God's initiative: You must act on *faith* in Him. You must make major *adjustments* to Him. You must *obey* Him. When you respond to God's initiative, you come to know Him intimately by experience. Living in faithful obedience to Him allows you to experience His presence. This is *koinonia* with God. Continuing in fellowship with God does not happen by accident. This fellowship can be broken. Sometimes what seems to be a good intention can threaten fellowship with God and with Christian brothers and sisters. To guard against broken fellowship, we need to identify and understand some essentials of genuine *koinonia* with God.

#### Matthew 22:37-38

"Jesus replied: ' "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind." This is the first and greatest commandment.' "

#### 1 John 2:15-16

"Do not love the world or anything in the world. If anyone loves the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For everything in the world—the cravings of sinful man, the lust of his eyes and the boasting of what he has and does—comes not from the Father but from the world."

#### Essentials of Koinonia

- 1 We must love God with our total being.

#### 1. We must love God with our total being.

"This is the first and greatest commandment" (Matt. 22:37-38). If you love God, you will obey Him (see John 14:21-24). If you love Him, you will also love your brother (see 1 John 4:21; 5:3). If your fellowship with God is right—if you love Him with your total being—you will even be able to love your enemies.

The threat to fellowship is anything that causes you to lose your first love for God. This was the problem with the church at Ephesus (see Rev. 2:1-7).

Loving money or things more than God will break your fellowship with Him. Your sinful cravings and lust can capture your first love. You can even fall in love with what you have or what you are able to do. When your love is not pure toward God, fellowship with God is broken. Your fellowship with others will then reflect your broken fellowship with God.

Suppose a person begins to love things more than God. When fellowship with God is broken, love for others will suffer. A person who loves things more than God will become stingy and greedy. When he sees a brother in need, he will keep his possessions to use for himself. He will not give to help others. He may start using God's tithe (tenth) for himself. Greed is a dangerous threat to fellowship with God (see Eph. 5:5; 1 John 3:17).

Materialism is a terrible trap that robs many people of their love for God. Churches can also be selfish and greedy, primarily using God's resources to satisfy themselves rather than to help a lost and needy world.


### 2. We must submit to God's sovereign rule.

God is your Master. Because of His perfect love for you, He demands absolute obedience. As the Head of the church, Christ demands submission to Him and obedience to His will. Absolute surrender to His lordship is necessary for right fellowship with God.

When people become "a law to themselves" (Hab. 1:7) and do what is right in their own eyes (see Judg. 17:6), the experience of *koinonia* becomes impossible in their lives and in the life of a church. Yielding your loyalty or allegiance to anyone other than Christ is spiritual adultery. If a pastor, the deacons, influential business persons, or a committee tries to run or rule the church, *koinonia* is threatened.

The problem always starts with an individual's or a church's relationship with God. When a person refuses to deny self and follow Christ, fellowship with God is broken. When self is in control, all other authority relationships will be out of control. Asserting self in the body of Christ robs Christ of His rightful authority as the Head of the body.

Fellowship is broken not only when an individual tries to be the head of the church but also when the church expects its pastor or another individual or group to rule the church. No individual or group can function as the head of the body if that church is to be a healthy body. It may look healthy on the outside, but God sees the rebellion against His Son's rule and deplores it. Every member of the church must submit to Christ's lordship over his life and to Christ's headship over the church.



In 1 Corinthians 1–3 divisions (broken fellowship) existed in the church because some were following Paul, some were following Apollos, and some were following Peter (Cephas). Paul condemned this kind of rebellion and rebuked any attempt to follow anyone other than Christ. To follow him or Apollos would be childish, worldly, and ungodly (see 1 Cor. 3:1-4). The church must have the mind of Christ (see 1 Cor. 2:16) and must follow Christ alone.

# Essentials of Koinonia, Part 2

Day 5

Yesterday you learned that *koinonia* with God requires that you love God with your total being and that you submit to His sovereign rule in your life. Many people, things, and influences in your life and in your church can threaten your fellowship with God if you allow them to distract you from loving Him and following Him. Today we will look at two more essentials of *koinonia* and possible threats to fellowship with God.

ONLY A PERSONAL ENCOUNTER WITH THE LIVING CHRIST WILL RESULT IN EFFECTIVE KOINONIA.

# 3. We must experience God in a real and personal way.

Your koinonia with God is based on your personal experience with Him. No substitutes will do. You cannot rely on the personal experience of your spouse, your parents, your pastor, your Sunday School teacher, or your fellow church members. Your koinonia with God must be real and personal.

Koinonia is threatened when you allow anyone or anything to make you a spectator rather than an active participant in relationship to God. You must encounter God firsthand, or you will become passive and apathetic. If you do not continually encounter God firsthand, your fellowship with God will grow cold. You will quit caring about God's concern for His church, His kingdom, and the lost world.

Although church organizations and programs are designed to promote outreach, growth, and ministry, they can lead to shallow relationships and indifference. If a church is not careful, it may help people experience a program but miss a personal encounter with the living Christ. Well-organized programs, plans, methods, and Bible studies are valuable, but they must not take the place of the Holy Spirit's personal guidance. Churches must make sure their organization encourages personal experiences with God.

Spiritual truths and realities that others have already experienced must not be taught just for the sake of knowledge. Instead, people must be led to experiences in which God reveals to them the same spiritual truth or reality in a personal way. Secondhand experiences will not suffice.

Agencies of a denomination, for instance, have a place in doing God's will in ways individual churches cannot accomplish alone. Yet individuals and churches must not allow the work of the denomination to become a substitute for their personal involvement in God's work. When that happens, the result is social and spiritual indifference

## 4. We must completely trust in God.

To experience genuine koinonia with God, you must depend on God to do the things only He can do. You must trust in God alone.

Once when Israel was faced with trouble, it turned to Egypt for help rather than to the Lord. God said to the nation, "Woe to those who go down to Egypt for help, who rely on horses, who trust in the multitude of their chariots and in the great

strength of their horsemen, but do not look to the Holy One of Israel, or seek help from the Lord" (Isa. 31:1).

Placing your trust in anything other than God breaks your fellowship with Him. Here are some examples of things in which you can be tempted to place your trust to accomplish God's work instead of trusting in God.

- Yourself, your abilities, your resources
- · Other people, their abilities, their resources
- Programs or methods
- Manipulation or coercion
- Pressure tactics or guilt
- Deceit

God provides people, relationships, resources, methods, and programs to be used by a church. However, a congregation that yields to the temptation to trust in these rather than the Lord displeases Him. Your church may be tempted to trust in yourselves; your pastor; a well-organized Bible-study program; a denominational agency; a bank; an outreach method; the government; or other organizations, people, or things. When you depend on any of these rather than God to accomplish His work in a church, fellowship with God and with other believers is broken. Sometimes leaders try to use pressure tactics to get members to do God's will. This tactic denies God's power to guide His people. When conflict arises, leaders may depend on a manual on handling church conflict instead of leading people back to trust in God and to love Him alone.

The Holy Spirit manifests Himself through believers and empowers them to accomplish God-sized tasks. God grows His church. The Holy Spirit produces unity. Christ brings forth spiritual fruit. You and your church must depend on God to accomplish His purposes in His ways through you. Completely depend on God.

Yes, God will call you to join Him. Yes, He will ask you to do things through which He will work. Often He will lead you to a program or method to help you organize and function to accomplish what He purposes. He will call you to use your money, resources, skills, and abilities. But in everything you must depend on God's guidance, provision, gifts, and power if you hope to bear lasting fruit. Without Him you can do nothing (see John 15:5). His presence creates and maintains fellowship, and He bears lasting spiritual fruit through an obedient and trusting people.

#### A GOD-GIVEN BURDEN FOR THE WORLD

When my wife, Marilynn, and I were teenagers, God placed a burden for the world on our hearts. Early in our marriage we heard a missionary issue a call to those who were willing to go wherever God called them. We both went forward and surrendered our lives to go anywhere God sent us. Our denominational mission agency preliminarily approved us to serve in Africa, but then our oldest son, Richard, came down with a mysterious illness. The mission agency encouraged us to delay going to Africa until doctors could determine the nature of Richard's condition. Over the next few months God made it clear He was calling us not to Africa but to Canada. When we arrived in Canada, doctors discovered that Richard no longer had the illness. We served for the next 18 years in mission work in Canada. During that time God taught me much about walking with Him by faith, and I was eventually asked to write about what I had learned in the course Experiencing God.

Over the years I have learned that although God does not call everyone to be an author or a preacher, He expects all of His children to have the world on their hearts. Can God impact the world through one life or one church? Certainly. He is looking for those people and churches today.

# A CHURCH MEMBER WITHOUT A RELATIONSHIP

I was preaching in a church one Sunday about the way Christ's presence dramatically affects daily living. At the close of the service, a man came forward weeping. The pastor had him share with the congregation the commitment he had just made. The man confessed that a decade earlier his wife had urged him to come with her to church. When he attended, he liked the people, enjoyed worship, and decided to join the church. Later, he heard that the church needed teachers in the Children's Sunday School Department, so he volunteered. Over the years he served in numerous capacities in the church, including being a deacon and a Sunday School teacher. Yet as I preached that morning, the Holy Spirit awakened him to the fact that he did not have a personal relationship with Jesus. This good man had been practicing religion without a genuine, life-changing relationship with Christ.

As I spoke of how the Holy Spirit walks with us to guide us each day, the man realized he was not hearing the Holy Spirit speak to him. As I talked of God's love for us, he saw that he served God but did not have a love relationship with Him. To his and the church's surprise, this man suddenly recognized that for all his service and attendance at church, he did not have an experiential relationship with God.

This man is not alone. One comment I hear from people who study *Experiencing God* is "I thought I knew what it meant to be a Christian and to walk with God. But after taking this course, I realize I was a religious person, but I did not really know what it meant to enjoy a personal relationship with Him."

This is the heart of this course: to move you from merely being religious to having a vibrant, real, growing relationship with God. In this unit we will address what it means to walk daily with God in a personal relationship with Him.

## Day 1

# Returning to God

Christians can encounter times when they lose their intimacy with God. Even the most zealous Christian can find that his love for God has cooled if he is not careful. The drift away from the Lord can be so subtle that you fail to recognize the loss until it is fairly severe. The Scriptures describe some ways you can know whether you are in a right relationship with the Lord or if you have departed.

How does this loss of intimacy happen? Three parables of Jesus in Luke 15 illustrate how. In one parable a sheep is lost (vv. 3-7). Sheep typically get lost from the shepherd when they turn aside to distractions. In the second parable a valuable coin is lost (vv. 8-10). Generally, valuables are lost through carelessness. No one means to lose something precious. But by not taking precautions, we can misplace even the most valuable possessions. In the third parable a son is lost (vv. 11-32). In this story the prodigal son deliberately chose to leave to indulge in a wasteful lifestyle that dishonored his father.

In similar ways, you can lose your intimate fellowship with God. Like a sheep (a), you can focus on the world and the things of the world, on pleasures and activities, or on other people and relationships. You lose your focus on the Lord, and before long you realize you have drifted far away. Like the carelessness that lost a valuable coin (c), you may fail to guard your heart and mind. When temptations come, your strength

to resist is not strong. Then sin robs you of your intimacy by breaking fellowship with your Lord. Or like the prodigal son (b), you may intentionally resist the Father's will through disobedience and the pursuit of sinful behaviors and activities.

Whenever you depart from God to any degree, He disciplines you in increasing measure until you return to Him. God loves you as His child and, as your Heavenly Father, will correct you until you turn from your rebellion (see Heb. 12:5–11). He will continue to bring discipline until it reaches a moment of crisis at which you must make a serious choice. You cry out to God in your distress.

Scripture promises that "if we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness" (1 John 1:9). You confess your sin when you agree with God about the awful nature of your wrong. Confession and repentance go together. When you repent of sin, you turn away from the sin and return to God. When your fellowship with God is broken because of sin, agree with Him about your condition and turn from it. Return to God, and He will forgive you and reestablish your fellowship with Him. This responding to God's discipline that results in restoration of life and vitality with the Lord is called revival. Another important Scripture that describes revival is 2 Chronicles 7:13–14.

God's remedy for restored fellowship with Him involves humility, prayer, seeking His face (seeking the experience of His presence), and repentance (turning from sin). He promises to hear, forgive sin, and heal the land. When we return to God (and not merely to religious activity), He returns to us in a fresh, close relationship and begins once again to fulfill His purposes for us (see **Zech. 1:3; 2 Chron. 15:2**). Revival means the life of God returns to our soul. This can happen to an individual, a church, a denomination, or a nation.<sup>1</sup>

If you find that your heart is not as enthusiastic and devoted to God as it once was, take a moment now and pray. Confess your sin and return to Him now so you can begin to experience His presence returning to your life. If you have not departed from God, pray about your commitment to remain steadfast and true to Him.

Confessing and returning to the Lord are good, but prevention is even better. Scripture gives much helpful counsel for keeping your heart from departing from the Lord.

# Experiencing God as Couples

Today's lesson for couples and tomorrow's lesson for parents may not be applicable to your circumstances. You may want to study them anyway. But if you prefer, use these two days for review and prayer.

People often ask me, "Henry, how do you explain how God has used your life to accomplish so much for His kingdom?" My response is always twofold. First, I am an extremely ordinary person. I have not done anything. I think God wanted to demonstrate what His incredible power could do in the lives of ordinary people, and He chose to work in my life. I have sought with all my heart to surrender my life to God, and the consequences of that commitment have amazed me. But the second thing I quickly add is this: "When God intended to use an ordinary life like mine for

His purposes, He chose to match my life with a life partner perfectly suited to me and God's direction for my life."

By nature I am a shy, introverted Canadian. My wife, Marilynn, is an extrovert who was born and reared in Oklahoma. We could not be more opposite if we tried. Yet God had an eternal purpose for both of us from the beginning of time. Both of our parents raised us to be active in our local churches. Our fathers were deacons. Both of our parents helped start new churches. Having grown up in such homes, we both surrendered our lives to do whatever our Lord commanded us to do and to go wherever He told us to go. Early in our lives we grew to love the local church and missions.

God's plans for me included learning to walk by faith through some extremely challenging times as a mission pastor in Canada and eventually traveling millions of miles around the world teaching others what God had instructed me. For me to fulfill God's will for my life, I would require a life partner with a unique calling of her own. Now God just had to get the two of us together! God did that by having me meet Marilynn at my roommate's wedding, where I was the best man, and she was the maid of honor. We were married a year later. What a joy to experience God's will together for these past 47 years!

Similar Different

As you yield yourselves to the Lord, He can take your similarities and differences and maximize your usefulness as a couple for His kingdom. For several years Marilynn and I led "Experiencing God as Couples" conferences across the country. It was marvelous to invite couples to stand together before God to see what He intended for their marriages. Ultimately, a course with videos was made of this teaching. An unusually high percentage of the couples at these events felt called into Christian ministry. Many marriages were restored. Once couples came to understand God's purpose for their marriages, they discovered a new and exciting dimension to their lives together. Today we will look at ways you can experience God together with your spouse.

#### God's Purpose for Marriage

Jesus said this of marriage: "Haven't you read ... that at the beginning the Creator 'made them male and female,' and said, 'For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh'? So they are no longer two, but one. Therefore what God has joined together, let man not separate" (Matt. 19:4-6). Marriage is God's joining together a man and a woman to create a union through which He can accomplish His purposes and be glorified. Marriage is not merely a human contract or agreement. It is a divine creation. God has a special purpose for each couple He unites. He is so committed to the sanctity of marriage that He hates divorce (see Mal. 2:16).



Once couples came to understand God's purpose for their marriages, they discovered a new and exciting dimension to their lives together.

What does it mean to be one flesh? It implies that your life is not your own. You are not two separate individuals trying to work out a coexistence. You are one. When your spouse feels pain, you suffer too. When your spouse experiences spiritual victory, you are victorious as well. When God has a plan for the wife, it means God's activity will affect the husband.



2 Describe one way you and your spouse have experienced an unusual God-given oneness.

At times someone says to me, "I want to go forward with God, but my wife is unwilling. Should I go on without her?" My response is "You are one flesh. You cannot leave your spouse behind." Others have said, "My wife clearly senses that God wants us to be more involved in missions, but I haven't heard God say anything to me." My response: "You are one flesh. If God spoke to your spouse, He has just spoken to you!" Because you are one flesh, you need to adjust your life to a word God speaks to your partner. Pray together and trust the Holy Spirit to bring clarity and assurance about the direction of His calling. Then you can walk together with confidence.

This is why I always strongly advise couples coming to me for premarital counseling to consider carefully where God is leading their potential partner. After they are married, God's directives to one will directly affect the other. I have known people who had a clear sense of God's leading in their lives in one direction, but after they married, they rejected everything God had previously said to them because their spouse was not interested in those things. When I asked Marilynn to marry me, I knew God had been working in her life long before she met me. Marilynn almost died when she was five, and after that she had a strong sense that her life belonged to God. So I asked her, "Marilynn, what has God told you He intends to do through your life? And what promises have you made to God? If I marry you, I vow to spend the rest of my life helping you keep every promise you ever made to God."

3 If you have not already done so, take time with your spouse and list on separate paper some things you know God has done and said to each of you. What commitments have you made to Him? What do you sense He desires from you that has not yet come to pass? How have you sensed God leading you both to join Him in His work? Check here when you have taken such a time with your spouse.

Being one with your spouse is critical to your ability to hear from God. That is why the apostle Paul warned believers not to marry unbelievers (see 2 Cor. 6:14). Paul said it is like trying to mix light and darkness. They cannot become one spiritually because they are opposite in their fundamental nature. The spiritual intimacy you have with your spouse will affect your walk with God. The apostle Peter said a husband who mistreats his wife will find that his prayers are hindered (see 1 Pet. 3:7). That is also why it is wise never to allow your anger or a damaged relationship to remain unresolved (see Eph. 4:26).

You may be studying this course and realize you are unequally yoked with an unbeliever. If that is the case, share this fact with your group and your church. Invite them to pray with you and walk with you and your spouse until he or she comes to faith in Christ.

# Joining God's Activity in Your Spouse's Life

One of the most exciting things you can do is to look to see where God is working in your spouse's life and join Him! You can do this in several ways:

- 1. Regularly pray for and with your spouse. God knows what your spouse is going through better than you do. He knows her fears and insecurities. God knows what He intends to do through your spouse's life. Praying regularly for your spouse enables you to gain God's perspective on your spouse. Couples can easily frustrate each other. If you look at your spouse solely from a human perspective, you will see his or her limitations, failures, and weaknesses. When you look at your spouse from God's perspective, you will see his or her unlimited potential in the hands of God. As you pray, God can alert you that you need to take a specific action, such as offering a particular word of encouragement or giving a note or a gift. God may show you abilities in your spouse that she does not see in herself. As I prayed for Marilynn, God affirmed to me that she has some wonderful insights into walking with God that can encourage many others. Although I have been the "professional" speaker throughout our marriage, I encouraged my wife to accept invitations that came her way because I sensed she needed to be a steward of what God had done in her life and such opportunities would richly bless others.

- 2. Regularly ask your spouse spiritual questions. Some Christian couples never speak to each other about God's activity. They may assume God is working, but they never talk about it. Ask each other questions like "What has God been showing you in your quiet times lately? Has God placed a particular burden on your heart as your have prayed? You seemed very intent during the sermon today. What was God saying to you?" I have also found my spouse is the best person for me to share God's activity in my life. As I relate what I have been hearing God say, my wife recognizes things I missed. Together we hear far more from God than we do separately.
- 3. Review your spiritual markers as a couple. As God leads couples in their marriage, they will experience key moments when God clearly, unmistakably speaks. Identify these spiritual markers and periodically review them as a couple. This helps in two ways. First, it prepares you to understand where God is leading you. When I came to my official age of retirement, I, like everyone else my age, had to decide what to do. Should I join a country club and buy a set of golf clubs? As we reviewed what God had done in our lives as a couple, we realized that all of our married life had prepared us for what God wanted to do through us next. We ultimately formed

Blackaby Ministries International so we could respond to God's invitations around the world to continue ministering. When our oldest son, Richard, sensed God leading him to join our ministry, we recognized again that this fit perfectly with the spiritual markers in our lives. We can respond to each new invitation God gives us because we have a clear sense as a couple of the way God has led us to this point in our lives. A second benefit of reviewing your spiritual markers as a couple is that it provides a wonderful opportunity to celebrate God's activity in your lives. Each morning Marilynn and I have coffee together and reflect on God's goodness to us for almost five decades. What joy that brings!

Take time this week to review your spiritual markers as a couple.

4. Minister together as a couple. God led you to your spouse for a reason. He had a purpose in mind. One purpose is to produce godly offspring (see Mal. 2:15). If couples look for God's activity together, they will discover there are ways God wants to work uniquely through them together to accomplish His kingdom purposes. I know couples who regularly go on mission trips together, teach a Sunday School class, teach English to immigrants, intercede for others, host a home Bible study, take international students into their home, and adopt foreign children. They find tremendous rewards in ministering for Christ together as a couple.

One couple had separate ministries for years. The husband served in the church as a deacon; the wife went on mission trips. After several years the wife finally convinced her husband to go with her on a mission trip. The man was overwhelmed by the experience. In tears he confessed to his wife, "Now I understand what you have been talking about all this time!" They had been missing the privilege of serving their Lord together.

What are some ways you and your spouse are presently joining God's activity together?

What are some ways you would like to?

5. Give together. Many Christian couples faithfully put their offerings in the offering plate each Sunday but have never discovered the joy of giving together. God is at work in the world around you. He wants you to become involved both personally and financially. Marilynn and I have found great joy in determining together where God wants us to invest the money He has given us. We support not only our local church but also various ministries around the world. This involves far more than writing a check. It includes seeking together how God wants us to invest our finances in His kingdom. Together we are laying up treasures in heaven.

God has called all of us to be on mission with Him. One of the first places we must seek His activity is in the life of the person we are most intimately related to. If God has given you a life partner, you will want to be involved in the great work God intends to do in his or her life.

# Joining God's Activity in Your Children's Lives

Marilynn and I were married in 1960 in California. Those were turbulent times! We were in Los Angeles during the Watts riot. I was doing graduate work near Berkeley University during the student protests. The local elementary schools regularly had air-raid drills to teach the schoolchildren what to do in the event of a nuclear attack. Many people discouraged us from bringing children into such a dangerous and unsettled world. But I noticed that throughout Scripture when times were difficult, God's answer was often to send a baby into the world. Isaac, Moses, Samuel, Samson, John the Baptist, and of course Jesus were God's response to difficult times. Ultimately, Marilynn and I had five children, four boys and a girl. All five are serving in full-time Christian ministry, and now our grandchildren are beginning to sense God's call to ministry as well.

When our first child, Richard, was born, I spent all night praying over him after we brought him home from the hospital. I believed that God had given him to us for a particular purpose. I sensed God wanted to use him in Christian ministry when he grew up. I also knew that being raised in a pastor's home, he would feel pressure from some people to simply follow in his father's footsteps. I never told him what I thought God wanted him to do. Instead, I prayed and asked God to show me how to raise Richard so he would have a heart to know and do God's will. There were some difficult times along the way. Richard experienced serious health problems as a child. During his teen years he had to decide if he would go God's way or the world's. When he entered the university, he began to prepare to be a high-school social-studies teacher. Believing that he was running from God's will, I prayed and sought to help Richard enter a walk with God in which he would obey what God told him.

Halfway through his freshman year at the university, I noticed Richard walking down the aisle of the church auditorium during the altar call. In tears he explained to me that he knew God was calling him into Christian ministry and that he had been running from God. He didn't want to be a pastor just because his dad was or because

everyone expected him to be, but he would resist no longer. For the first time I told my oldest son I had known all his life that God was calling him into ministry. With a startled look, he asked, "Well if you have known for so long, why didn't you tell me?"

"I wanted you to hear it from God" I replied. Today Richard is the president of my ministry! Likewise, God gave us opportunities in each of our children's lives to help walk with God so they would not miss anything God intended to do in their lives. Scripture indicates:

Sons are a heritage from the LORD,
children a reward from him.
Like arrows in the hands of a warrior
are sons born in one's youth.
Blessed is the man
whose quiver is full of them.
They will not be put to shame
when they contend with their enemies in the gate (Ps. 127:3-5).

Not everyone will be married or have children. For those to whom God entrusts them, children are a special assignment as well as a reward from the Lord. Wise parents understand that God has a special purpose for each child He gives to them, and they should carefully watch to see where God is at work in their lives.

☐ John the Baptist Luke 1:13-17 God has a unique purpose for each life. As He did for the psalmist, God determines that purpose before we are born. Just as God intended for Jeremiah to be His prophet before he was born, God has purposes for each of us. The apostle Paul identified one of God's eternal purposes for every person: "Those God foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the likeness of his Son, that he might be the firstborn among many brothers. And those he predestined, he also called; those he called, he also justified; those he justified, he also glorified" (Rom. 8:29–30).

## 3

### What is one thing God wants for every person?

God's eternal purpose for each of your children is that they be conformed to the image of Christ. If they are willing and responsive, God will draw each of your children into a unique love relationship with Him. He will speak to your children and will use the circumstances in their lives to fashion them into Christlikeness. There are several ways you can join in God's activity in your children's lives:

- 1. Pray with and for your children. Prayer is not primarily for us to tell God what we want Him to do for our children. It is for God to adjust our lives so we can be God's instrument in their lives. We don't always know what is best for our kids. We aren't aware of all they experience at school. We don't see all the temptations, criticisms, threats, or pressures they undergo. God does not make our children immune to difficulty, but He alerts parents so they can be God's spokesperson when their children need to respond to the circumstances in their lives. God also knows what the potential of each child is when placed in His hand. As much as we love our children, we can't begin to imagine all God has in His heart for them (see 1 Cor. 2:9). That is why we rob our children if we merely seek to have them meet our expectations. We need to be on God's agenda for our kids' lives so they can experience the abundant life God intends for them (see John 10:10).

- 2. Talk with your children about God's activity. Parents talk to their children about numerous things, but no topic is as important as discussing God's activity in their lives. Deuteronomy 6:6-9,20-25 instructs parents to regularly talk with their children about God's activity. Parents should rehearse with their children God's acts throughout their family history. Parents ought to recount to their children how they met Christ personally, how God led them to be married, how God guided them in their careers, how God led them to their church, and how God has walked with them through the years. Parents should point out to their children God's ongoing activity in their lives so they learn to recognize God's activity for themselves.

As my kids have grown older, I have had the privilege of speaking and writing with all five of them. Last year I had a new first. I spoke at a men's conference along with my oldest son, Richard, and his oldest son, Mike—three generations of Blackabys all ministering for their Lord together! It is important to model for our children how to join God's activity. When we heard of a new opportunity for ministry God had given, we shared it with our children and asked them what they thought God wanted us to do in response. As our children grew older, they recognized God at work around our family and suggested ways they thought our family should become involved. As Marilynn and I have watched our children mature, we have realized our greatest single contribution to God's kingdom is teaching our children to watch to see where God is at work around them and then join Him.

## Experiencing God in the Marketplace

For too long Christians have assumed God's activity generally occurs at a church building on Sunday. In reality, throughout Scripture God was continually at work in the marketplace. When God launched His great work to bring salvation to all humanity, He called Abraham, one of the most successful businessmen of his day (see Gen. 24:35). Abraham's son Isaac also prospered in the marketplace (see Gen. 26:12–14). Likewise, Isaac's son Jacob became wealthy through his business acumen (see Gen. 30:43). Joseph served God not as a preacher or a missionary but as a grain administrator (see Gen. 41:37–57). Moses had a profound encounter with God while working as a shepherd (see Ex. 3:1–6). Elisha was invited to join God's activity while plowing a field (see 1 Kings 19:19–21). Amos declared that he was not a prophet or the son of a prophet

but a sheep breeder and a tender of sycamore trees (see Amos 7:14). Daniel served God as a government official.

Jesus was trained as a carpenter. When He began calling the 12 men who would walk with Him as His disciples, He called fishermen (see Mark 1:16-20), a tax collector (see Mark 2:14), and other career people. I believe one reason Jesus called businesspeople is that they are not intimidated by the world. They live and thrive in the marketplace. Once these businesspeople had experienced life-transforming encounters with Jesus, they were prepared to turn their world upside down! Joseph of Arimathea was a businessman who, though fearing the religious leaders, had the courage to approach the Roman leader Pilate for Jesus' body (see Mark 15:42-43; John 19:38). Lydia, a businessperson, was a key member of the church in Philippi (see Acts 16:14-15). Two of the apostle Paul's supporters in his church-planting ministry were Aquila and Priscilla, also businesspeople (see Acts 18:1-2).

One of the greatest movements of God I am seeing today is His work in the marketplace. I work with a group of Christian CEOs of some of America's largest companies. These men and women have realized God has placed them in their positions for a purpose. These business leaders impact the lives of tens of thousands of employees. They control huge advertising budgets. They have access to world leaders that missionaries do not. One businessman's company produced power plants. He provided one free to a village in Africa on the condition that he could tell the villagers why he was helping them. By the time the power was turned on in that village, the chief and almost all the people had become believers. Another CEO gives Bibles to world leaders as gifts when he visits their country on business.

Many people are discovering that God has placed them in their companies so they can be witnesses to their colleagues as well as to customers. I could tell you numerous stories of people who led their colleagues to faith in Christ. I know business leaders who lead Bible studies for their staffs during the lunch hour. Some physicians pray with and share Christ with patients. Many of the people who meet Christ in a workplace would never have dreamed of visiting a church on Sunday, so Christ sends

His servants to job sites where they encounter people who need to hear about Him. I believe churches ought to have commissioning services for those who go into the marketplace every Monday morning in the same way we pray over missionaries who travel to other countries to share the gospel.

God is at work among businesspeople around the world. Many of their hearts are restless as they realize that reaching the top of the corporate ladder or achieving their financial goals does not bring the peace and contentment they have sought.

One businessman was at work when the Holy Spirit drew his attention to a particular colleague. Although the Christian did not know the other man well, he felt impressed to ask to have lunch with him. Over lunch the man confessed that just that morning he had left his wife. Before that day was over, the Christian had led his troubled coworker to place his trust in Christ and to be restored to his wife.

As a salesman made the rounds in his community, the Lord drew his attention to a house for sale. A few weeks later he noticed a moving van in the driveway of that house. Two weeks later he spied a wheelchair ramp being installed to the front door. Every time this Christian drove by that home, he felt the Spirit nudging him to find out who lived there. Finally one day as he drove by, he strongly felt that he should stop and visit the new home, so he approached the house and rang the doorbell. The house was not far from his church, so he decided to invite the stranger to his church. He was met by a disabled man with a bitter, lonely story. He was deeply grateful someone had cared enough to come by. The man said he had noticed the church and wondered whether its people were friendly. Now he knew.

Other businesspeople have discovered that God has granted them prosperity so they can invest their wealth in the kingdom of God. Suddenly, rather than being absorbed in their work, these men and women have found that a new world of God's activity in His kingdom has opened to them. Some have begun using their resources to build church buildings around the world. Others have invested in Bible colleges and seminaries that are training people for Christian ministry. Others have supported orphanages and ministries to those suffering from hunger and disease. Jesus commanded those who would be His followers, "Seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well" (Matt. 6:33). This command is not just for people in full-time Christian ministry. Jesus expects every disciple to make his or her first priority to be involved in the building of God's kingdom and then to see how God provides for all their other needs.

# Continuing to Experience God

Two persons were walking together on their way to Emmaus, a town roughly seven miles from Jerusalem (see Luke 24:13-35). They were discouraged. They had chosen to follow Jesus, and they had been excited about all He had done and taught. Then Jesus had been cruelly taken from them. Now they were bewildered, not knowing what to do next. Suddenly a stranger joined them and asked what they were talking about. They explained what had happened and that they could no longer follow Jesus as they had intended. Over the next few miles the stranger explained to them that the events surrounding Jesus' death were not the end but the beginning of an exciting new opportunity to walk daily with the Son of God. Rather than being taken from them, Jesus was now closer to them than they could have imagined!

you commune with Him, you will keep your focus on Him and be reminded that you are to follow Him daily.

- Pause now to pray. Ask the Lord to cultivate in you an intimate, consistent communion with Him.
- **4.** Strive to keep your vows to God. Ecclesiastes warns, "When you make a vow to God, do not delay in fulfilling it. He has no pleasure in fools; fulfill your vow. It is better not to vow than to make a vow and not fulfill it" (Eccl. 5:4–5). Throughout this course God has spoken to you. You may have made several commitments to Him in response.
- A Review your spiritual journal or the daily-review activities in this book. On separate paper make a list of commitments you have made to God. Keep that list in your Bible where you can review it regularly.

Remember that God takes our promises to Him extremely seriously. God is not mocked. Be diligent to follow through with everything you promised God you would do. Remember, a good intention is not the same as obedience. There are no substitutes for obedience!

5. Take time to process what God has said to you or done in your life through this course. God may have spoken to you many times over the past weeks. If you do not let this material soak into your heart and life, however, it may be like the seed that fell on stony ground and was soon taken away (see Matt. 13:20-21). Processing God's Word means allowing God to explain and apply all He has said to you. It is not enough to agree with what God said in your mind. You must also apply God's Word in your heart and life.

If, for instance, God spoke to you about forgiveness, it is not enough to believe in forgiveness. You must ask God to examine your heart and relationships to see if you have not truly forgiven someone. If God reveals someone to you, ask Him to show you what action you must take to be reconciled. Don't treat God's truth as a doctrine to be believed but as a reality that must be lived and experienced. If there are special truths God revealed to you during this study, don't let them be lost when you put this book on your bookshelf and go on to your next study. Identify all the truths God revealed to you and meditate on them until you are assured that you understand and experience everything God intended when He revealed them to you.

- As time allows before your final small-group session, review the most meaningful statements or Scriptures you listed at the end of each day in this study. Of all those statements or Scriptures, which one has had the most profound impact on your thinking, your actions, or your life?
- 6 As you come to the end of this course, take a moment to write on separate paper a prayer of commitment to the Lord. Tell Him how you intend, with His help, to walk with Him in the coming days. Sign and date your prayer so you can return to it in years to come.

Many people who study Experiencing God feel a letdown when they finish the course and stop meeting regularly with their small group. Many tell us they hated coming to the end of the course because they feared their Christian life might go back to the way it was before. Let me encourage you by saying that this does not need to be the case. Your encounter with Christ through this material has not been an end but a beginning. I pray God has shown you how you can experience a love relationship with Him that is real and fresh every day. I trust that you have been challenged to watch to see where God is at work and then to join Him. I hope you have made the adjustments in your life that God has asked for and are now obeying everything He has told you to do. But all of this is only the beginning! God wants you to know and experience more of Him. He wants you to understand new truths that will set you free (see John 8:32). There is far more of God's nature, His purposes, and His ways that He wants to reveal to you. This course should be only the starting point for a whole new adventure in following Christ daily. As you prepare to move to the next stage in your walk with God, consider adopting a few practices that will help you to continue going deeper with your Lord.

1. Stay immersed in God's Word. Remember God's instruction to Joshua: "Do not let this Book of the Law depart from your mouth; meditate on it day and night, so you may be careful to do everything written in it. Then you will be prosperous and successful" (Josh. 1:8). Make it your habit to read God's Word daily. God has many more truths to reveal to you if you will give Him the opportunity.

2. Remain intimately involved with a church family that will love and nurture you. Hebrews urges us: "Let us not give up meeting together, as some are in the habit of doing, but let us encourage one another—and all the more as you see the Day approaching" (Heb. 10:25). God made us interdependent on one another. You cannot experience all God has for you apart from the rest of the body of Christ.
